Women's Cooperative Beekeeping Project January – December 2024

1. Project Overview

- Title: Women's Cooperative Beekeeping Project
- Location: Mpongwe District, Copperbelt Province, Zambia
- Duration: January December 2024
- Objective: Empower rural women through sustainable beekeeping enterprises, improving household income, food security, and environmental conservation.

2. Background & Rationale

- Rural women in Mpongwe face limited income-generating opportunities and are disproportionately affected by poverty.
- Beekeeping is a low-input, high-impact green enterprise that supports biodiversity and provides steady income through honey and wax production.
- This initiative aligns with Zambia's National Gender Policy and international frameworks on women's economic empowerment and climate-smart livelihoods.

3. Activity Components

- **Women's Training:** 25 women trained in modern beekeeping, hive management, and cooperative leadership.
- **Hive Distribution:** 100 sustainable hives provided, with protective gear and starter kits.

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• **Cooperative Formation:** Establishment of a women-led cooperative with bylaws and governance structures.

- Market Development: Branding, packaging, and establishing linkages with buyers in Mpongwe and Lusaka.
- **Environmental Stewardship:** Promoting forest protection and pollinator-friendly practices.

4. Detailed Execution Phases

Phase 1 – Mobilization & Training (Jan–Mar 2024): 25 women recruited; training workshops held.

Phase 2 – Apiary Setup (Apr–Jun 2024): 100 hives distributed; demonstration apiary established.

Phase 3 – Cooperative Launch & Market Preparation (Jul–Sep 2024): Cooperative formally registered; branding and packaging designed.

Phase 4 – First Harvest & Sales (Oct–Dec 2024): Initial honey harvest processed and marketed locally and in Lusaka.

- 25 women trained in beekeeping and entrepreneurship.
- 100 hives distributed with protective gear and equipment.
- Women's cooperative established with clear governance structures.

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- First harvest generated \$10,500 in honey sales.
- Household incomes rose by 30% among members.
- Increased environmental awareness and pollinator protection in Mpongwe.
